Lost the plot on lost balls?

An unusual situation that came up recently revealed that none of those playing (myself included) interpreted the rules correctly. As it turned out, the end result was fine, but... The rules say a ball is lost if it isn't found after looking for it for 3 minutes. They also say that a found ball cannot be "declared lost". But there is no requirement to search for your ball! *Whaaat??*

First 'Third Thursday Tipple' winner



Ironically, Malcolm doesn't drink whisky. So, he donated his winnings as a raffle prize in support of the outgoing senior captain's charity (more on that overleaf). Even if you drink it yourself, the entry fees go to support the club, so never before has chasing whisky been such a worthwhile cause!

Lost the plot? (*cont'd*)... But you can't simply decide to switch to your provisional ball. You have to play a new shot.

However, you can decide not to look for your ball. Simply play your provisional and keep playing it. It remains a provisional ball so long as you only hit it when is further from the hole than the likely location of the ball you've not looked for. But once you've played it from a position that is

closer to the hole, it is no longer a provisional and becomes the ball in play. For clarity—in the picture—when the ball is on the tee, at A, and at B, the ball is still provisional. But once you hit it at B, it becomes the ball in play.



Another alternative is to play a second ball but not declare it as provisional. In that case, it immediately becomes the ball in play. Seems a bit of unnecessary twaddle to me but I hope that clarifies. If anyone has any other rule interpretations they'd like to clarify, let me know and I'll do a bit of research and post the answer in the newsletter!
