My golfing icons #3: Justin Rose

A perfect English Rose. Well not in the context that we use it in day-to-day speech but more a dedicated ambassador for the game of golf off the course and a fierce competitor with a British Bulldog spirit on it. Justin is the third icon in my series.



So why is Justin so special to me as a golfer?

He's what the word professional was invented for. The epitome of calmness with a steely resolve, especially on the green. One of the best approach players in the game with sublime putting skills. He connects with the fans, media and wider golfing fraternity with ease. He's so likeable, supporting of his fellow players and is the centre of entertainment when the team is out on the razz. A real team player.

The fact that Justin is still challenging for championships at the age of 45 is testament to his physical and mental conditioning. Born in South Africa, he moved to England when he was 5 when he took up the game. He broke 70 for the first time at the age of 11, was playing off a +3 handicap by 14 and then finished 4th in the 1998 Open playing as amateur at 17, holing out 50 yards away on the last from the rough. Wow, that's an impressive start to a golfing career.



Justin won his first and only major in 2013, winning the US Open. He's been in the playoffs for the Masters 2 times, losing this year to Rory McIlroy and in 2017 to Sergio Garcia. His consistent top 10 finishing in major tournaments has netted him career earnings close to \$60 million. He is mostly known for winning the Olympic Gold medal for Team United Kingdom in 2016. He was ranked No.1 in the World in 2018.

His performances in the Ryder Cup are legendary. Appearing in 7 competitions with a record of 16 wins in 33 matches. He's a hot favourite to be the next Captain of Europe.

Justin is married to former international gymnast Kate Phillips and splits his time between The Bahamas and London. They are both heavily involved in sustainable golf facilities and supporting young players in the game. Justin was awarded an MBE in 2017 for his services to golf. To me he's just the perfect English golfer, is Rosie. *Ed: Thanks for this series, David.*
