

However, to the accompaniment of the theme tune from *The Good, The Bad and The Ugly*, he dodged a bullet in the three-man shootout for Bandit of the Year. He was pipped on a show of hands by John Matthews with Simon Elliott happy to come third.



John had the round of the Year, four under par, in leading his team to victory in a waltz. The following week the six-handicapper had four birdies on the back nine in winning the November round of the Len Kennedy Trophy with 41 points.

He and his partner, Ray Pipe, last year's Bandit, won our second Seniors Open by five points but even that was dwarfed by their terrific achievement in winning the National Club Golfer magazine's matchplay event.

LOOSE IMPEDIMENTS

You probably know that you can remove loose impediments near your ball or on your line of play (Rule 15.1). Just don't move your ball while doing so otherwise it's a one stroke penalty.

Remember also that if the ball moves it must be replaced in its original location otherwise, you're playing from the wrong place and that's another two strokes (or loss of hole in matchplay) (Rule 14.7a).

That's the basics but what about when you're taking

relief? If the intended drop area is full of loose impediments (leaves, twigs, etc.) you can move them before you take your drop. Example your ball is on the road at the second hole. You determine your point of relief (not nearer the hole, but it's covered in leaves. You can move these before dropping your ball (knee height remember).

That's a pretty significant advantage as you'll have a reasonable chance of a cleaner strike so it's definitely worth taking the time.
