

# Profile: our new Seniors Captain

You will know already, or will have guessed, that Simon Gates is a former scratch golfer. We hold him in such high esteem that he had been a member of our section for less than a year when he was invited to be captain.

"It was a bit of a shock, but I am happy to do it. It's nice to put something back," he said.

He owes us nothing, but is "putting back" into a game which has brought him much pleasure since he gave up his previous passion of cycling. He rode in prestigious events like the Milk Race and Tour of Ireland before opting to put his maths and accounting degree to more lucrative use.

Raised in Halifax, he began work with Coopers and Lybrand in Leeds, then moved south with the Midland Bank. At 34 he joined Deloittes and settled in Dorking, Surrey.

"Everybody at work played golf, so I joined a club called West Hill then switched to Windlesham, where I became club captain," he said. "I got down to scratch after about 12 years and got the call to play for Surrey when they were playing on the shorter courses."

While most myopic seniors might think he hits it out of sight, 61-year-old Simon does not concur. It's one reason why he prefers Barnard Castle to the "long slog" at Rockliffe.

He and his wife, Sandra, also love Teesdale, where he enjoys walking his dogs on the moors above their Newbiggin home.

"We always intended to move north after retirement," he said. "Work took me all over the world but I'd had enough of being away so much and retired at 50. We already had a cottage in Mickleton so we knew the area well."

His son, Josh, a student at Stirling University, plays off plus two. He was 19 when he won our club championship at the first attempt last summer. He also starred for the TDU team as they gained promotion to division one, with his dad helping out when needed.



Simon's ninth hole-in-one came at the eighth in the Saturday Winter League. "It landed just in front of the pin and we heard it rattle the flag. As we approached we could see it resting against the pin then it suddenly dropped in.

"I really like the course. I never get bored playing it and it's the right sort of length for me. I also enjoy visiting other courses so I'm looking forward to leading out the team in our matches."
